Can describe in simple terms aspects of his/her background, immediate environment and matters in areas of immediate need.</p>	<p>The EP Languages intermediate level course is based on practical relevant topics to help students function in everyday life in the target language. Can produce simple connected text on topics which are familiar or of personal interest.
