

A Quick Guide to Rethinking Assessment in Languages



Ideas for Language Teachers & Heads of Departments (HoDs)

Language assessment is changing. Schools are moving away from one-off, high-pressure tests towards ongoing, authentic approaches that focus on student growth. This shift gives a truer picture of learning, reduces stress, boosts engagement, and builds real-world communication skills.

For Language Teachers

Make speaking a regular, low-pressure habit

Speaking can be one of the most anxiety-inducing skills to assess. Replace the single end-of-term oral with short, frequent speaking tasks built into everyday lessons.

Example: End each week with a quick speaking prompt based on recent topics. Use recording tools so students can respond privately, creating a natural record of progress.

Focus on progress over perfection

Overemphasis on grammar can hold students back from taking risks. Celebrate small wins and visible improvement over time.

Example: When giving feedback, highlight one clear improvement since the last attempt, then offer one or two specific next steps.

Build portfolios to track authentic learning

A single test can't show the full scope of ability. Portfolios allow students to showcase speaking, writing, reading, and listening across contexts.

Example: Include audio clips, short written pieces, vocabulary checks, and project work in a digital portfolio. Review periodically with students to set new goals.

Use technology to personalise assessment

Digital tools make assessment more flexible and engaging, from vocabulary quizzes to speaking prompts, and provide instant insight into learning needs.

Leverage data to guide feedback

Use reporting tools to see patterns in student progress and adapt tasks to close gaps before they widen.

Example: Identify common challenges from quiz results, then assign targeted follow-up tasks for small groups.

Encourage self-assessment and reflection

Self-assessment builds ownership and awareness of learning.

Example: After each task, have students rate their confidence in key skills, note one strength, and set one improvement goal to review before the next assessment.

Utilise existing resources

Access the wealth of pre-made resources on offer that provide authentic contexts and scenario-based assessments to connect classroom learning to real-life situations, making language use more meaningful.

For HoDs

Support innovation in assessment

Encourage your team to trial flexible, authentic approaches and share what works.

Example: Use department time for teachers to swap ideas, then refine them together.

Invest in comprehensive tools

Select platforms that align with your curriculum, offer flexible task types, and provide actionable data.

Example: Use analytics to see whole-class trends and zoom in on individual needs to guide planning.

Provide ongoing professional learning

Keep staff confident with evolving assessment practices.

Example: Run workshops on using technology for authentic assessment or designing tasks for mixed-ability and neurodiverse classes.

Balance innovation with workload

Shifting approaches takes time. Use existing tools and resources to lighten the admin load so teachers can focus on feedback and planning.

Foster a culture of reflection

Build regular post-assessment discussions into your department's rhythm.

Example: Hold quick sessions where staff evaluate how well tasks captured learning and how they might be improved.

Align assessment with student engagement

Especially when language study is optional, assessment should inspire students to continue.

Example: Introduce low-pressure, authentic tasks early so students see quick wins and relevance.
